During a recent visit to be with our daughter prior to the birth of her son I shared memories of her own arrival into the world. It was *Her* “birth story” which she and her husband were genuinely interested to know specific details. Certainly she had heard much of the story at various times in her life but now was different. This was another bonding of their lives together and the connection to their son!

Later as we waited at the hospital while our daughter was having a C-section my mind journeyed through those same stories of our daughter’s birth and all that surrounded it. Certainly similar to most but yet uniquely “her” story! During these events my brother shared remembering when I was born and riding to the hospital with our father to bring me home. As I waited I prayed the Rosary which added to my thoughts of the “Our Stories” of the mysteries we meditate on while praying this beautiful prayer. Those stories are *our stories* too! Stories that connect us to our faith and beliefs.

Our faith life is sometimes beyond words when we make a connection to Jesus through the various mysteries such as His birth story and the circumstances of Mary visiting Elizabeth and how John “Leapt” in her womb! Doesn’t that stir your emotions to meditate on that story?

Throughout this time my daughter and son-in-law were experiencing what is now “their story” of the birth of their first child! Our FIRST grandchild, John Paul! I thought of various Bible stories of Jesus such as a young boy who was lost and found in the temple and thought; baby John Paul will have stories too.

My thoughts of “our stories” are never far from my mind because I work with Alzheimer’s patients and their families. I’m always looking to “know their story” in order to make a connection to them. In this way I can talk to them about things in their past and in doing so, they

feel a sense of comfort and safety through someone knowing them. During Holy Week this year I attend Mass alongside of two of my Alzheimer’s patients and sat between them. A gentleman and a lady. Fr. Don Halpin celebrated Mass for us at the nursing home. As part of his homily he spoke of “the stories” of these folks. Stating a quick timeline of their past lives of how they may have lived their younger years. Stating maybe it was getting married, starting families, working, retiring, coming into old age and being in their current community. He didn’t shy away from saying he suspected many were now looking to their final days when they too would come to meet the Lord and know everlasting life through Jesus dying and rising. Throughout the Mass my *two friends* on each side touched my heart and this moment has stayed with me. The male resident stated “Yes Father” and “Thank You Father” at various times as well as appropriate responses to prayers. While the lady is saying aloud not only our responses but Father’s prayers as well. The pivotal moment was when Eucharist was offered. The gentleman with tears in his eyes states “This is wonderful! Thank you Father!” Then turned to me and grabbed my hand and repeated again, “This is

These two individuals have impaired cognition and have significant memory loss but yet they have retained the ability to grasp the beauty of the Eucharistic feast!

And people wonder why we would bring an Alzheimer's patient to Mass! These two individuals with Alzheimer's have a connection to their faith! They know the story of Jesus and have bonded with him in their earlier years. This engrained faith life has meaning still today. Again this is their "Story" of their life long faith and remains after many other memories fade. *Yes it is so wonderful it's hard to describe!*

We come to share our story. We come to break the bread.
